Husky Parade Saturday in city

Governor Ned Lamont today announced that the State of Connecticut, the City of Hartford, and the Hartford Business Improvement District will host a victory parade and rally in downtown Hartford on Saturday, April 13, to congratulate the UConn men's basketball team for winning the 2024 NCAA National Championship.

UConn won its sixth men's basketball national title Monday with a 75-60 victory over the Purdue Boilermakers at State Farm Stadium in Glendale, Arizona.

The parade will begin at 11 a.m. and will step off at the State Capitol building at the intersection of Trinity and Elm streets. It will proceed north on Trinity Street, under the Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Arch, turn right onto Jewell Street, left on Trumbull Street and end at the intersection of Asylum and Trumbull streets.

A victory rally will be held outside of the main entrance of the XL Center on Trumbull Street where the players, coaches, and other guests will be invited to give speeches.

"For the second year in a row, the UConn men's basket-ball team wowed the nation by dominating the NCAA tournament, and now it's time for Connecticut to give them the victory celebration they deserve," Governor Lamont said. "I urge basketball fans from all over Connecticut to come to Hartford on Saturday morning and

InterCommunity to get \$561K in grants

InterCommunity health care centers of East Hartford was awarded \$561,113 through the state's Nonprofit Grant Program, the governor announced.

The funds will be used for an HVAC project at 361 Main Street, which is estimated to cost \$361,250, and \$199,863 for construction of a "Mobile Unit Barn."

The grants were among those announced by Gov. Ned Lamont, approximately \$35.5 million for state nonprofits for needed capital improvement projects. The state's Nonprofit Grant Program is administered by the state Office of Policy and Management. The grants will fund items not typically reimbursed through other sources.

"Connecticut's nonprofit providers support residents in every town and are a vital part of our social services safety net," Governor Lamont said. "Providing funding to make strategic investments helps these organizations deliver the services some of our most vul-

Man shot during dispute behind Silver Lane business

Police found a man in the parking lot who had been shot in the chest. Life saving measures were performed by East Hartford Police and the East Hartford Fire Department. The victim was transported to the hospital by ASM where he was said to be in stable condition.

Police later learned the victim had been involved in a physical dispute with the suspect prior to being shot in or around the gym when the suspect pulled out a firearm and shot,

then drove off.

Police identified the suspect as 33-year-old James Tate of West Hartford who turned him-

Tate was charged with Assault 1st degree, Reckless Endangerment 1st degree. Carrying a Pistol Without a Permit, Illegal Discharge of a Firearm, and Breach of Peace 2nd degree. He is currently being held on a \$250,000 bond.

East Hartford police are still investigating the incident.

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PLANNED DEVELOPMENT



A proposal to construct a cobination of residential and retail stores on a one-acre parcel at 351 Silver Lane at the corner of Warren Drive has come before the town's Planning and Zoning Commission. The proposed project consists of one three-story building which will include 3,400 square feet of retail/quick-service restaurant space, five studio apartments, twenty one-bedroom apartments, and ten two-bedroom apartments. The commercial space will consist of two units and will be located on the first story of the building. The proposed development will also include the construction of a 67 space parking lot,

amenity/dog walking area, landscaping, and other site improvements. The parking lot will be configured to the east and south of the proposed building, will full-movement intersections on Warren Drive and Silver Lane. Douglas Wilson, the Local Traffic Authority and Town Engineer, sees no immediate concerns with the application in regards to traffic, according to the documents submitted by owner, Nam Hue 351 LLC for the town's Planned Development District R-3 zone which calls for zoning flexibility in order to encourage a higher density of activity, mixed uses, more robust design standards and environmental protection.

Goodwin U LPN program approved

Goodwin University is excited to have received state approval to launch a new Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) certificate program to help further address an ongoing nursing shortage across the state of Connecticut. The Connecticut Department of Public Health, **Board of Examiners for Nursing** (CT BOEN) approved the certificate program on Thursday, April 4, allowing the University to admit its first cohort of students in May 2024. With this LPN certificate program, Goodwin rounds out its broad range of nursing programs offered that includes Associate Degree in Nursing (RN), Accelerated BSN, RN-to-BSN, Master of Science in Nursing, APRN Family Nurse Practitioner, and APRN Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner.

The LPN program is led by Dr. Vivienne Friday, Dean of the School of Nursing and Health Professions, and Karyn Therrien, Director of the LPN program. "LPNs are critical members of a healthcare team, and we're incredibly excited to have gained approval from the state to enroll our first cohort of LPN students this summer." said Therrien, "With teaching facilities in both East Hartford and Bridgeport, we're proud to be helping to address the state's nursing shortage head on."

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After hiking electric rates, utility reminds customers who need it to apply for relief

Eversource is alerting customers that utility service shutoffs for non-payment will resume on May 2, regardless of hardship status. Service shutoffs are a last resort, and the energy company encourages anyone who needs help paying their bill to take advantage of assistance programs.

Customers that meet state income eligibility requirements are eligible for financial hardship programs including:

Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) -Households can get up to \$530 in CEAP funds this winter heating season. Apply online at https://ct.gov/heatinghelp or apply with a Community Action Agency (CAA). Visit 211.ct.org or call 211.

The Matching Payment Program - For every dollar they pay and every dollar they receive from the CT Energy Assistance Program, we will subtract a dollar from the amount they owe. Customers should visit Eversource.com/billhelp to see if they qualify and enroll.

The New Start Program can help pay off a past due balance with on-time monthly payments, some of what is owed will be subtracted each month.

Electric Bill Discount. A new electric bill discount is available to customers with a financial hardship status on their electric account. Insurance industry shores up resources to address climate change

The Connecticut Insurance Department (CID) announced its participation in the adoption of the firstever National Climate Resilience Strategy for Insurance by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC). Commissioner Andrew N. Mais, also serving as the NAIC President, participated in a media briefing Friday, April 5th, to discuss this initiative.

The NAIC National Climate Resilience Strategy for Insurance aims to mitigate losses and expedite recovery from natural disasters, safeguarding the nation's property insurance market. Developed under the guidance of the NAIC's Climate and Resiliency Task Force, this strategy outlines state regulators' plans to collect data, blueprint flood insurance, leverage catastrophe modeling, develop new resilience tools, advocate for mitigation funding, and enhance solvency oversight.

"Closing the protection gap and ensuring insurance availability and reliability are paramount in the face of climate risks", said Commissioner Andrew N. Mais. "The National Climate Resilience Strategy provides a crucial blueprint for state insurance regulators to strengthen communities and enhance resilience."

Connecticut's participation in this initiative aligns with the state's ongoing efforts to mitigate climate risks and enhance consumer protection. Governor Ned Lamont has put forth a proposal in the current legislative session concerning climate resiliency planning, Senate Bill 11, that specifically directs the Insurance Commissioner to convene a working group of stakeholders to study the need, structure, and feasibility of a program to assist homeowners and small businesses—especially in vulnerable communities—with fortification activities, including incentive programs and funding sources to protect against climate-related risks.

CID is collaborating with states nationwide to establish a comprehensive database that will enable state insurance regulators to more effectively monitor their homeowner markets, pinpoint evolving trends, and identify potential coverage gaps on an annual basis.

CID has also adopted and implemented the NAIC's TCFD-aligned Climate Risk Disclosure Survey, which requests, on an annual basis, a non-confidential disclosure of certain domestic insurers' assessment and management of their climate-related risks across four

thematic areas – governance, strategy, risk management, and metrics and targets. CID reviews these survey responses, in conjunction with key data from other climate-related financial solvency tools, to inform its financial oversight of the marketplace and assure insurers' financial condition and ability to cover claims.

The big risks inherent in this small New England state include:

- · Over \$700 billion worth of property insured on Connecticut coastline, 6th highest of 18 Atlantic states.
- · 64% of all insured property in Connecticut is on the coastline, 3rd behind Florida and New York.
- · Nearly 60% of Connecticut is forested and this state is among the most densely populated.

"Through initiatives such as the proposed Mitigation Grant Advisory Council, our active participation in the NAIC Climate Risk Disclosure Survey, and the annual Connecticut Conference on Climate Change and Insurance (C4i)", said Commissioner Mais, "we remain committed to safeguarding our communities, mitigating loss, and fostering resilience as we confront the chal-

lenges posed by climate change."

East Hartford residents made their mark in our State Capitol building

Did you know East Hartford's handprints are clearly visible inside the state's Legislative Office Building (LOB) located alongside the capitol.

Walking through the LOB last week, for the first time in about forty years, I noticed East Hartford's influence across the structure. As a young reporter, I was introduced to John Larson by then Governor Bill O'Neill. Larson, at the time was a young Democrat leader working on the opening of the legislative building. His career is well known in town and reflects the importance of East Hartford in the state and the country.

Besides this connection, other East Hartford achievements and accomplishments fill several of the pictorial displays. But beyond this there are names enshrined across the complex if you know where to look.

The Connecticut Hall of Fame is located in the secondfloor atrium. There are 27 names listed on the wall display. Among these names are town honorees Landscape Architect Frederick Law Olmsted and Aviation Engineer pioneer Frederick Rentschler.

But not all the enshrined names reach into the distance past. Some of these remarkable Connecticut natives have been seen walking the streets in my life-time. A military display in the tunnel between the legislative office and the capitol, is dedicated to Connecticut soldiers, as well as outstanding veterans.

Among the names of the Wall of Honor for the Afghanistan/Iraq conflict is Army Sergeant Richard Ford, a resident of town.

Another item in the display, is a plague noting the Connecticut Veteran Hall of Fame. This plaque dates from 2005 and is

headed by two very interesting names: the first inductee is Nate Agostinelli the second is President George Bush.

The first of these men is well remembered and respected here in the East Hartford and Manchester area. He served not only as a mayor of Manchester, but was President of the Man-

chester State Bank, and once held the elected position of State Comptroller.

Agostinelli died last month and few people who ever meet him had a harsh word to say. He was involved statewide in gathering money for various veteran organizations, while serving as a commander in the state national guard. He retired as a Brigadier General, having started as an enlisted man in the Korean Conflict. He then received a presidential appointment as a civilian aide to the Secretery of the Army.

His efforts helped save the Army-Navy Club in Manchester, the oldest such club in the nation, older than the American Legion. He also helped obtain funds to various East Hartford organizations over his years of public service.

East Hartford's Thomas Sheridan shares the plague with President Bush, Governor O'Neill and General Agostinelli. Enshrined in 2012, Sheridan was a lawyer, who was the longest serving Clerk to the state's Senate. He over saw the rules and procedures of the Senate during his public serv-

Boy, the LOB has changed over the years since I was last there. Guess we should visit more often.

Rosarians to give cultivation pointers



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

What a year for UConn hoops

Congratulations to the UConn women's basketball team. They exceeded most expectations with a magnificent run in the NCAA tournament, knocking off #1 seed USC to advance to the final four where they took another #1 seed, Iowa, led by Player of the Year Caitlin Clarke, to the final seconds of the game of the tournament, falling short on the tournament's most controversial call, a moving screen on Aliyssa Edwards with the ball in Paige Bueckers hands, UConn down one, four seconds to play. 14 million tuned in to see the nation's

two best players, Clarke and Bueckers, go head up.

For all his success, this may have been Geno Auriemma's best coaching job.

The UConn men own the college basketball world today, claiming their second straight national championship with a 75-60 win over Purdue in a battle of number one seeds in Glendale, Arizona Monday night. The Huskies never trailed in this one, battling to a six point lead at halftime before dominating the second half, Final Four Most Outstanding player Tristen Newton nailing a three out of the gate to make it nine points, a margin they mintained until the first media timeout of the second half. At the second media timeout it was 13, at the third it was 17 and pretty much over.

Purdue's 7-4 national Player of the Year, Zach Edey, got his points and rebounds, but his supporting cast couldn't match UConn. Edey had 37 points and ten rebounds, many of his stats coming in cleanup time with UConn's 7-2 center Donovan Clingan on the bench with four fouls. Brandon Smith had 12 points, no other Boilermaker had more than five. Clingan and Samson Johnson, who eventually fouled out, effectively manned up Edey, limiting his effectiveness while the game was still a contest.

UConn's the first team in 17 years to win back to back championships. No team has ever accomplished the feat in such a dominating manner. The smallest margin of victory in their 12 straight tournament wins was 13 points, their average winning margin in this year's tournament was 23.3. Their point differential for the six games was an NCAA tournament record plus-140. UConn now trails just UCLA and Kentucky in total national championships, with six.

Four UConn starters, Newton, Clingan, Stephon Castle and Cam Spencer hit double digits, the fifth, Alex Karaban, had eight points. Hassan Diarra came off the bench with nine. Beyond Edey, Purdue didn't have the fire-power to respond. Newton had 20 points, seven assists and five rebounds and was joined by Castle and Spencer on the All Final Four team. If Castle opts for the NBA, none of the three will return next season.

UConn coach Dan Hurley now stands shoulder to shoulder with such coaching legends as John Wooden and Mike Krzyzewski. Hurley, however, authored the greatest two year run in NCAA Tournament history.

The Huskies finish the season 37-3 and return to Storrs to breathe some rarified air. Nowhere in the nation does basketball enjoy the status the two teams at UConn have brought to their little corner of Connecticut.

Our confidence is pretty high right now and if we can get the car half as good as it was at the Fall Final, we should be pretty good at the Sizzler®."

Galko's off-track career landed him in North Carolina back in January where he is now working as part of the engineering team in the research and development department

"We're happy to have Stash Butova back on board as the crew chief after I tried to do my own thing last year and it ended up being a lot for me to drive and worry about everything else," said Galko. "Having him back with us is a huge help. Being down in North Carolina, I can't do this without my Dad, Stash, Dave, and all the guys. They've been busy picking through the car and even though I'm not able to help them, I have full confidence that they'll have the car in top shape.'



nerable residents depend upon. This grant funding will help all of the residents that these organizations support be able to utilize their personal strengths, talents, and passions."

Established in 2013, this program has provided more than \$130 million to the state's non-profit organizations, supporting about 750 projects. Today's awards, which support 94 projects, are the program's eighth round of grants.

Over the past four years, the state has provided more than \$1 billion in additional funding to strengthen and support nonprofit providers. During the current biennium, additional state support for nonprofits totaled more than \$650 million – an increase of more than \$206 million over baseline appropriations. There is also \$50 million in capital funding for the next round of the Nonprofit Grant Program.

Thge grants fund facility alterations, renovations, improvements, and additions; new construction; health, safety, and Americans with Disabilities Act projects; energy conservation improvements; information technology systems; technology that promotes client independence; purchase of vehicles; and acquisition of property.

Browse through 5,000 square feet of books, games, dishes, tools, artwork, jigsaw puzzles, toys, furniture, machinery, household and sports items, near-antiques, glassware, holiday décor, and items both useful and decorative. There are four miles of trails at the farm, a story book trail, and a sheltered pavilion so you can shop and hike on the same day.
