EHHS launches Class of 2025

Once again the sun shone at just the right time for the 460 members of the graduating class of 2025 Tuesday evening at East Hartford High School.

Class President Israela Anane gave a synopsis of high school life, noting "you are still here" despite the hallway dramas, unexpected changes and times that were a little bit chaotic, but in the end we were always a family."

Remember, she said, " no path is better than yours. There is no set path; walk the path that is yours. Value yourself, value your mental health," she urged, concluding "we are leaving with a story that is better than what is written."

Anane, Jenna Walton, Salutatorian and Afrin Galliwala, Valedictorian, all plan to attend the University of Connecticut, they are among the 78 percent of the Class of 2025 who will attend a two or four-year institution of higher education. Nine percent of the class will attend a trade or technical school, according to Principal Matt Ryan, 5 percent will go into the workplace, and six percent plan to join the military.

Grand Marshall at the ceremony was the high school's teacher of the year, Rebecca Cutkomp, who led the class out

Stewey the Duck urges pool safety

U.S. Sen. Richard Blumenthal, a lifetime swimmer, joined Stew and Kim Leonard Monday at Glenbrooke Sports Club off Oak Street Monday to call attention to water and pool safety as the summer swimming season begins.

The occasion was the presentation of a \$5,000 check to the club and Rose Rainville to offer swim lessons to 400 kids this summer which will help address an uptick in child drowning deaths. The senator, Rainville, Mayor Connor Martin and the Leonards gave a united appeal to parents to keep an eye on kids around he water and not get distracted by a cell phone.

[•] "Drowning is preventable. Every single drowning is preventable," Blumenthal said.

Of the roughly 4,300 drowning deaths reported annually in the United States, nearly 1,000 involve children aged 1 to 4, according to data released by the World Health Organization.

"Drowning can happen in seconds, in literally two feet of water," Blumenthal said. "You don't need a pool to have a drowning. It can happen in a backyard play thing."

Stew Leonard Jr. and his wife, Kim Leonard, whose 21month-old son Stew Leonard III (Stewie) died in a 1989 drowning accident, have since founded the Stew Leonard III Water Safety Foundation. The organization has raised over \$6



With his beloved late wife, MaryAnn, he created Crystal Ridge Winery in South Glastonbury, which has become a destination for locals and visitors.

Others to be honored are community organizer and consultant Janice Flemming-Butler. founder of Voices of Women of Color (VOWOC), an outreach and engagement firm uniting stakeholders to move projects forward. A veteran community organizer, political consultant,

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EDITORIAL How many more Juneteenths will America require?

The Town of East Hartford will hold its fourth annual Juneteenth Celebration on June 14, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the East Hartford Town Green, 1047 Main Street. The annual celebration, a combined effort of the Public Library, Parks & Rec, Commission on Culture and Fine Arts and the East Hartford Black Caucus, features a wide range of family-friendly activities. The event will be a stage show curated by the library, showcasing local talent and performances that honor the spirit of Juneteenth.

It also honors the spirit of East Hartford.

Along with the entertainment, there is an important, serious message to the storytelling.

It reminds us of the importance of freedom, certainly, but it is also a warning about the message of not being informed, of being kept in the dark, of not believing the changing reality.

Juneteenth, also known as Juneteenth National Independence Day, marks the emancipation of enslaved African Americans in the United States. Also referred to as Jubilee Day, Emancipation Day, Freedom Day, and Black Independence Day. What ought we reflect on today? This annual event comes as the freedom of peaceable assembly seems threatened in America. It is hard to celebrate freedom when people are being rounded up and deported. Perhaps there will be a new day, antoher Juneteenth, when these times will have run their course and we can all recognize and pay tribute to the strength, resilience, and contributions of all Americans. For today, this celebration provides an opportunity for East Hartford to come together, remember its shared history, and look ahead to a more inclusive future for all.

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Nothing's stagnant when it comes to history

Did you know that history is not stagnant. Each generation approaches it differently.

As we now acknowledge what our fathers tried to ignore, it was William Rogers of Rogers' Rangers who captured Nathan Hale, instead of an anonymous British subject, showing just how mainstream history has changed.

Take Main Street East Hartford, the street we travel today. This is not the "main" street the founders of the town used. That was Prospect Street, much closer to the Connecticut River. One of the joys of growing old in an area is being able to see landmarks of your past. Sometimes even landmarks of your parents' and grandparents' past. So it is with East Hartford. Many of the 'historic' sites still call to us, like our elementary school and teen hangouts. But of course, with time, other such locations have fallen to remodeling or the wrecking ball. My generation remembers

ball. My generation remembers chillin' at J.M. Fields, Bradlees, Friendly's, Knudsen's, Bergren's Dairy, the Charter Oak Mall, the Skating Palace East, Kings, Mammoth Mart, Burnham & Brady Candy Box, Lums, Showcase Cinemas. Such was local life back as early as 1983. Less than four decades ago.

In 1983 the East Hartford Historical Society led a 'house tour.' This event is actually captured in one of their society booklets, a house tour publication. 1983 was a significant year for East Hartford – the Bicentennial of the town officially incorporated in 1783. You paying attention in class know this.

This little booklet lists a dozen homes of historical sig-

nificance for East Hartford, opened by their owners for anyone to visit on this May tour:

Mrs. and Mrs. D. Wills on King Street;

Mr. and Mrs J. Egan on Springside Street;

St. John's Episcopal Church on Main Street;

Mr. Canio Toglia on Burnside Avenue;

Mr. and Mrs. M. Kilgariff on Garvan Street;

Mr. and Mrs. P. Young on Porter Street;

Mr. and Mrs. A. Hollister on Naubuc Avenue;

The Huguenot House and One/Room Schoolhouse at Martin Park;

Mr. and Mrs. M. Thoresen on Holland Lane;

The Fire Museum on Forbes Street;

Hillstown Grange on Hills Street.

The little booklet served as the passport for admission, and also contained a public 'thank you' to all the homeowners for allowing strangers to visit.

In 2025, what has changed? Of these 12 homes and buildings most are still available to admire for one driving past. One is actually up for auction this month.

Located on Springside

Street, the home is traced back to Colonel William Pitkin, the son of Governor William Pitkin. It is described in the booklet as a saltbox design with an 'ell'. The booklet dates its construction between 1750 and 1760.

"The main house is of superior framing and detailed construction and four of the original rooms have fine mideighteenth century paneled wainscoting." The booklet states, as well as noting "Connecticut Roses" carved in the pilasters. The 1983 owners were said to be 'restoring the property to its Colonial state.'

Over the years (not just the 42 since the tour) the structure has witnessed many changes, from its beginnings as a single-family dwelling, to being lifted and dismantled to move to its current location. Time found it used as offices for a fertilizer factory and for tobacco storage.

Today, once again, it is a residence. Time for a new owner to either maintain its character - or change it to fit the needs of the times.

Asking my non-history oriented wife if we should bid, and she replied 'we already have a home with a scary fieldstone basement with tree trunks serving as house beams.' She's right. Why start anew.

The reader will note that East Hartford will be 250 years old in 8 short years: 2033. AI now quickly informs that is known as a 'Semiquincentennial'. But it can also be referred to as a 'Sestercentennial' or 'Quarter Millennial'. I don't know about you, but I favor 'Quarter Millenial'. They better not name it after our bygone era - that of the penny.



Kevin Casey, a fan for all seasons

I've been a presence in the Connecticut sports media for more than half a century. After a few years as a fill-in host on two sports talk shows on WINF radio in Manchester, in the mid 70's, thanks to the efforts of legendary UCONN Huskies voice George Ehrlich, I was given my own show. I hosted the program until I moved on to become the sports director at, then, all news WPOP radio and the voice of UCONN sports on the Connecticut Radio Network.

The first regular caller to my own talk show was a freshman at Penney High School in East Hartford named Kevin Casey. At that time in my career I would

have been grateful for any callers, especially ones who became regulars, but Kevin was special.

I quickly detected that he was multi-faceted, well versed in politics, current events and, especially, sports. Even at a young age he was a sports statistician who was the equal of Bill James before anyone heard of Sabermetrics. If we ever disagreed on a statistical point I always bowed to Kevin, wisely realizing I was not his equal on the subject.

Kevin frequently showed up at high school football and basketball games George and I were calling and took up a seat behind the broadcast locations to feed me up to the minute stats. Whenever I could scrape up a few extra bucks I'd hire Kevin as an official part of our crew as a statistician and spotter. He was also a fountain of inside information on local sports teams and sports personalities. While most people working in sports have a particular strength Kevin didn't have one. He was equally strong in all sports.

One year I convinced WINF to increase our coverage of the annual Thanksgiving Race from one announcer at the start and finish line to on air spotters along the course and I hired Kevin to be one of our spotters. Though he never worked professionally in the sports media I could always count on him to take a job seriously and get it done in a professional manner. Kevin and I remained friends over the years, our paths frequently crossing on my returns to Connecticut.

I was stunned last week when I opened the *Gazette* to my column and saw Kevin's name and picture on the facing page, the Obituaries. Kevin passed away May 26th at the age of 63.

Kevin, it was a pleasure having you as my first regular sports talk caller, a greater pleasure having you as my friend.

Türkiye takes 'friendly', 2-1

The U.S. Men's National Team fell 2-1 to Türkiye in East Hartford, Conn., on Saturday in what was the first of two friendlies against UEFA opposition ahead of the 2025 Concacaf Gold Cup. Four players made their senior Men's National Team debuts as the young U.S. team showed an improved effort and determination against an experienced Turkish side.

The scoring started early on Saturday, as midfielder Jack McGlynn netted a goal in the first minute of the game, electrifying the crowd of 34,023. McGlynn took control of the ball off a leading pass from Malik Tillman, and just as the 21-year-old approached the box, he confidently struck from 18 yards. The shot curled off his left foot and into the far side netting away from Turkish goalkeeper Berke Özer's reach. It was McGlynn's second career international goal, whileTillman recorded his first international assist on the play.

However, Türkiye capitalized on two key moments before halftime. The Turks tallied their first goal in the 24th minute after USMNT midfielder Johnny Cardoso's attempted clearance inside the 18-yard box met the

million to fund water safety initiatives, according to its website.

Their foundation has provided more than \$1.5 million in Learn to Swim grants to Connecticut-based organizations, resulting in about 155,000 free and low-cost swimming lessons for children across the state, according to their website.

"What Stu and Kim have done with the tragedy that befell them in their own lives is absolutely amazing and inspiring," Blumenthal said. "They have literally saved thousands of lives."

On Monday, the foundation donated \$5,000 to Glenbrooke Sports, which will go toward swimming lessons in memory of Ralph Viola, who designed and maintained the facility's pools for decades. His daughter, Rose Viola, now oversees the center.

"He was so passionate about swimming lessons," Viola said. "There's no telling how many children in his lifetime he taught to swim."

According to data released by the CDC, about 40 million adults reported not knowing how to swim. More than half of adults reported never having taken a swimming lesson.

Leonard emphasized that one of the simplest things parents can do is stay alert around water and minimize distractions.

"We talked about putting cell phones down and being attentive when you're around the water," Leonard said. "That's one thing the young moms and dads can do that are listening."

Leonard also stressed the importance of early swim lessons.

"Forget the swimming part of it," he said. "All they got to do is learn to roll over on their back ... about four lessons. You will save their life."

This press conference was held just months after the Trump administration's decision to eliminate the CDC's drowning-prevention team, which had worked with groups like the YMCA and American Red Cross to get at-risk kids into swim programs.

"There is nothing partisan or political about water safety." Blumenthal said. "There is no red or blue kind of aura to teaching kids how to swim or preventing them from drowning."

Leonard reflected on the painful lesson that drives his family's advocacy.

"Our son slipped in the pool when we were all here, and nobody noticed him for just that little two, three minute window, and he drowned," he said. "Losing a son, you know, or a daughter, a little child, is probably one of the most devastating things that could happen in your life."
