Leora R. Levy, Erick Russell win party votes

East Hartford Republicans chose Leora R. Levy over Themis Klarides for United States Senate in Tuesday's party primary, 331 to 199 – Peter Lumaj picking up 41 votes.

For Secretary of State the GOP went with Dominic Rapini with 305 votes to Terrie E. Wood's 194. Rapini will face Democratic choice Stephanie Thomas who is the endorsed state party candidate. In East Hartford Democrats gave

Thomas 909 votes to Maritza Bond's 347.

In the Democratic primary for state treasurer, endorsed Democrat Erick Russell garnered 758 votes to Karen Dubois-Walton's 283 and Dita Bhargava's 210 tallies.

The August 9 primary saw 19.6 percent of East Hartford Republicans cast ballots, or 577 of 2,945 eligible party registered voters. Democratic numbers were 1,298 turning out, just 9.6 percent of the town's 13,545 registered Democrats.

School rally fills Town Green

East Hartford's Town Green was packed with dutiful parents and eager children Wednesday, all seeking backpacks filled with school supplies and signing a pledge to do their best in the coming school year.

Getting the traffic run-around makes drivers steamy

Road construction is steaming along everywhere, from Main Street to the highways, testing patience of drivers as they are slowed and detoured around barricades and byways. This week there was a report that an East Hartford man lost his cool and got out of his vehicle to pop a highway worker in the face, frustrated at being delayed coming or going to work.

No, no, no and no. We ask ourselves, how did road repairs and traffic delays come to blows? When someone races past or cuts us off, it is startling to be sure. But try telling yourself that the impatient driver may be rushing to the hosRoute 2

Suffering is the right word. Reconstruction of the Route 2 entrance ramps, combined with loss of the exit ramps, has diverted all P&W commuters down Main Street to Maple Street where there is no protected left turn arrow onto Maple Street. So Pratt workers exiting onto Brewer Street are sent on a loopy runaround East Hartford, going from High Street south to find the highway.

At the same time, Riverside Drive is closed randomly with zero public notice given as drainage repairs are made under the highway. in a detour nightmare just as the school year and all the bus traffic returns.

There is a good, if not scientific reason why it seems every road is getting resurfaced at the hottest time of the year: Asphalt flows better when hot. So as temperatures are no doubt rising for all of us, which wears all patience (along with the gas being wasted as you idle), the ideal pavement conditions are when temperatures are rising. Summer roadways created at the hottest time of the year will endure longer and be smoother in the long run.

So be patient - oops, we said that already.


Bueckers tore her left ACL in a pickup game last week and is already a scratch for the entire 22-23 season. Hopefully it's not an omen of things to come.



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

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
