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# Muralist inspired by town

Artist Sophie Groenstein said her mural facing the parking lot of the Odessa Terry Pool she completed in October was inspired by the diversity of East Hartford and the fun of a watery environment.

Featuring jellyfish, sea turtles - and abstract and realistic portraits "it is about fun, waterbased activities and representing the community."

Working with the CT Murals collective, which has been contracted by the town to install public murals at five outdoor spaces in town, the Windsor artist said she was left to follow her own imagination for the mural.

Her company, Sophie Groenstein, LLC, has designed and installed mural art and banners for Hartford's Southside Institution Neighborhood Alliance, Back East Brewing in Bloomfield, Lucky Dog Refuge CT in Stamford, Evergreen Walk in South Windsor, Dom's Broad Street Eatery in Windsor, and Harry's Pizza in West Hartford.

The Terry Pool mural was completed in just six days in October.

"The pickle ball players came over to watch me every day, offering suggestions," she related. "It was pretty much left to whatever comes to mind." The striking woman depicted is not anyone local, she said, just an image she found online.

Next she is painting the upper level of Hartford's Parkville Market, and murals at LesserEvil Snacks in Danbury

# Brewer street repairs delayed

#### by Bill Doak

Commuter headaches for residents in the neighborhoods west and off Brewer Street will continue until just before Memorial Day 2024.

Ekaterine Tchelidze, Mayor Connor Martin's Chief of Staff, issued an advisory that Brewer Street will remain closed to through traffic due to the closure of the asphalt plants December 1. The snag is the extensive utility line replacements on the bridge over the Pewterpot Brook, which carry a combination of gas and water pipes.

"Please be advised that the Brewer Street bridge over Pewterpot Brook will not reopen at the end of 2023, as originally anticipated. Work has been suspended due to unanticipated delays related to the work by utilities on their infrastructure, recent low temperatures, and material (asphalt and concrete) temperature restrictions," stated Tchelidze's press announcement. "The best quality construction (and least cost to the town) will be ensured by resuming work in April 2024. The bridge site will be secured with fencing to restrict access to the unfinished bridge."

Workers from Pratt and Whitney have been using an access road off Main Street north of Augie & Ray's to get into work, but that is not an option for neighbors as Contractor's Road is a private roadway off Brewer.

The town noted the portion

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

#### Towns receive thousands from 'nickel per nip'

Connecticut's "nickel-per-nip" environmental stewardship program is helping clean up Connecticut, according to reports pouring in from all over the state on how cities and towns are spending the money generated by the sale of the 50ml "nip" containers of alcohol in their communities.

Upon the \$2.36 million being sent to cities and towns at the end of October, the two-year-old program has now generated \$8.9 million for Connecticut municipalities that sell nips. Under the state law, proposed by Three Tiers for Connecticut and passed in 2021, a nickel surcharge is placed on the sale of each nip container at the point of sale.

Every April and October each municipality receives five cents for each nip sold within its borders during the preceding six months.

"In just two years, this groundbreaking program has generated \$8.9 million in litter-reduction funding that goes directly to cities and towns that

sell nips," said Lawrence F. Cafero, Jr., President and Treasurer of Three Tiers for Connecticut and Executive Director of Wine & Spirits Wholesalers of Connecticut, Inc. "After two years, we thought it was time to take stock in how those nickels are being put to work.

"Studies show that most litter from nips happens very close to where the containers are purchased," Cafero explained. "In just two years, this local solution has become a national model."





GEAR UP CT is a 7-year, \$25.8 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education with three sites: East Hartford Public Schools/CT State Manchester: Meriden Public Schools/CT State Middlesex; and Waterbury Public Schools/CT State Naugatuck Valley.

Together, GEAR UP CT works to achieve a number of target goals and objectives.

The GEAR UP East Hartford - MCC team works with students on a post high school game plan, be it two or four year degrees or directly into the workforce.

GEAR UP East Hartford currently serves the Class of 2025 with 498 students enrolled in the program.





#### Lanny Laranson, one of the best

New England lost a sportscasting legend last week. Lanny Lee Larason, better known by his professional name, Tom Larson, succumbed to complications from cancer at the age of 84.

Larson's career in Boston broadcasting began in the mid '60's at WSBK Channel 38, where he served as public affairs director and talk show host, and spanned more than four decades. In 1981 he became the sports director at WHDH radio where, in 1983, he was

named Boston's best sportscaster by Boston Magazine.

With the broadcast range of channel 38 and WHDH radio, Larson's celebrity

stretched well beyond Boston's city limits, spanning New England. His 'legacy

moment' came in 1981 when he grew a beard and announced he wouldn't shave it off until the Bruins, who had last won a Stanley Cup in 1972, won another one. He couldn't have known at the time it would be thirty years before he would again appear clean shaven.

Growing up as a sports fan in New England I was well aware of Tom Larson, who'd transitioned from public affairs to sports through the late '60's and '70's. He was a consummate professional. I was always an admirer of his work and, as I began my own venture into the sportscasting world less than a decade after his arrival in Boston, I was envious of his position - understanding the hard work that goes into establishing a relationship with a market like the one he had in Boston.

I didn't know Tom Larson well. But in 1986 our careers paths crossed when we were both hired by the New England Sports Network, or NESN. It was the cable venture of the Boston Bruins and Red Sox that had just celebrated its second birthday, and just beginning to spread its wings on the way to becoming New England's premier sports media force.

Tom was hired as a full timer to specialize in pregame programming for Red Sox and Bruins games. Happy with my regular employment at WTIC radio, I signed with NESN as a "contract" player. As a result, Tom and I never worked together. But promo sessions and network Christmas parties gave us opportunities to share sports conversation and media philosophies. He was congenial, intelligent, committed to his profession and capable of quickly putting someone who admired him as much as I did at ease. He gave off the impression that, despite his lofty position in one of the most competitive sports media markets in the nation, he was just another guy who went to work at a job in which he took great pride.

It struck me that he never thought of himself as anyone special; as if he believed anyone could step in and do his job with similar competence. It was probably that aura that carved out such a special place for him among Boston sports fans.

He was honest. He looked them in the eyes and told them what he believed to be true. You can't ask for better than that. You can't ask for better than Tom Larson.

# Mitchell having solid senior season for USJ Blue Jays

East Hartford's Tyree Mitchell is contributing to the University of Saint Joseph (USJ) men's basketball team as they held off visiting Nichols College Bison, 77-70, in the James A. Calhoun Gym in West Hartford Nov. 14.

With the triumph, the Blue Jays remained perfect at 3-0 on the season. After the visitors scored on their opening possession, the Blue Jays ripped off a quick 8-0 run featuring back-to-back three-pointers from sophomore guard Lence Altenor (Everett, Mass.) and senior guard Chaylyn Martin (Hart-

ford, Conn.) and a steal and slam by sophomore Friedrich Feldrappe (Berlin, Germany) to put USJ up 8-2 three minutes in.

However, the Bison countered with a 15-4 run over the ensuing three minutes, fueled by a trio of three-pointers from senior guard Mykel Derring (Boston, Mass.), to retake the lead, 17-12.

Saint Joseph chipped away and eventually knotted the game at 19-all just over two minutes later thanks to Mitchell's three-pointer from the left wing. Mitchell's triple keyed a subse-

in her digital library. She adored dramas like Pride and Prejudice, Downton Abbey and Virgin River and could often be found watching them over and over again.



and inside Back East Brewing in Bloomfield.

Many of her clients discovered her work via word-ofmouth or viewed her art on social media. In late summer, she was contracted by a California muralist to assist her with a project in Milford, Conn. Sophie creates some of her murals inside her Windsor garage studio space, but paints most of her projects directly onto walls or other surfaces.

Although educated in traditional fine arts, she taught herself how to paint at a large scale and dove into a world of murals. At a young age, she was introduced to the Hartford art scene and incredible muralists who were developing vacant walls and turning them into an immersive, public space. Her very first mural was installed in Windsor's Sage Park Middle School in 2022, just months before graduating from the University of Hartford.

"Being able to express myself through murals influenced me to continuously learn about the history of a community through a new lens and perspective; uplifting the residents through respect and equity," explains Sophie. The multi-faceted creator's distinctive style emanates positivity and binds the dynamic spirit of the surrounding community so she can share their story, inspire reflection, and form connections. Her mission as a professional muralist is to empower those of all ages to find their inner artists and to represent communities of all backgrounds through her art.

In the last past year alone Sophie's paintings and illustrations have been displayed at a variety of exhibitions including The Gallery at WeHa Brewing & Roasting Co.'s "Monthly Artist Pop-Up" in West Hartford, Hartford Art Space Showcase in Hartford, Windsor's First Town Downtown's Monarch Festival Art Pop-Up, Gastro Park in West Hartford, and Art for AIDS in Hartford.

A student in Hartford Public Schools from kindergarten through middle school, Sophie then attended and graduated from Windsor High School. #### Brewer Street to remain closed until May

of Brewer between Glenn Road/Contractor Road and Mill Road (the closed portion of Brewer Street) will be paved to allow the town to plow and residents to access their driveways. The bridge and the portion of Brewer Street are being widened to accommodate firetrucks needing to access Main Street from the new Fire Station No. 3 on Brewer Street, relocated from Main Street in 2010.

The Brewer Street road closure came as a surprise to town officials when the poor condition of the patchwork bridge was uncovered. Concrete portions were added onto a 1938 structure, and then utility companies told the contractor they wanted to upgrade the gas lines. So the project, originally slated to be completed this month, became much more complicated.

"A gas main, a water main, and several dozen communication conduits had to be relocated between the bridge beams as part of the project," explained Town Engineer, Douglas Wilson to the Hartford newspaper. Wilson said new bridge retaining walls and foundations were built, and the old utility lines, which hung just above the brook, were elevated in between the new bridge beams above the high water level. The concrete decking still needs to be poured. The new bridge will have a span of 24 feet. Wilson said cold temperatures have halted the construction.

"Asphalt plants also are closed for the winter and reopen in April," he added.

reconstruction Brewer Street is an \$8 million widening project from Main to Jefferson Lane and will include a new traffic signal at the intersection of Brewer and Contractors and Glenn roads, as well as an intersection change at Main and Brewer streets, where there will be new sidewalks, new storm drainage, and road reconstruction.

Wilson said that more than 90 percent of the funding for the project is from state and federal sources with the town's ongoing Road Improvement Program covering the rest.



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
